UKRAINIAN STUDIES AT THE UNIVERSITY

OF ALBERTA, 1978-79:

THE SOCIAL SCIENCES

The University of Alberta has been a pioneer in the development of Ukrainian studies in the social sciences at the post-secondary level of education. It was the first Canadian university to introduce courses on the history of Ukraine, the history of Ukrainians in Canada, and the politics of the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic. It presently offers the widest range of Ukrainian-content courses on the North American continent. Some courses are offered in the evening so that working people interested in their heritage can also attend.

Students seeking B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees in history and political science with a Ukrainian or Ukrainian-Canadian specialization can benefit from the University of Alberta's broad spectrum of courses in Ukrainian and related subjects, from consultations with the scholars who teach these courses, from outside lectures, and from a growing library already rich in Ukrainian holdings.

The Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies is located at the University. Although the Institute offers no courses or degree programs, it encourages and coordinates the development of Ukrainian studies nationally. Locally, it offers seminars, lectures, and houses reference facilities (the reference library and Ukrainian Language Resource Centre). Its academic staff consists of recognized specialists in Ukrainian studies. This academic year the University of Alberta is offering the following social science courses in Ukrainian Studies:

- HIST 327. Twentieth-Century Ukraine. *3 (Second Term, 3-0).

 World War I and the emergence of the Ukrainian Republic. Ukrainian lands in the USSR and Poland during the inter-war period. World War II and Nazi occupation. Soviet Ukraine since 1945. Mondays, 6:00-8:50 p.m. I. L. Rudnytsky.
- HIST 425. Topics in Ukrainian History. *3 (Either Term, 3-0).

 Main currents in Ukrainian social and political thought. A seminar for advanced students. Prerequisite: Previous history or Ukrainian studies courses, or permission of instructor. First term, time to be announced. I. L. Rudnytsky.
- INT D 444. Ukraine: An Interdisciplinary Study. *3 (Second Term, 3-0).
